Meaning and Complexity

 It seems to me that the application of a word appears to be more related to aspects of complex systems than to the hard and fast sets of necessary and sufficient conditions demanded by essentialist, nominalist or functionalist theories of meaning.

Meaning and Complexity

- We know how to play complex language games that are embedded in history, practice, custom, "forms of life".
- I think that it is well worth exploring the actual use of a word in order to demonstrate the intricate web of rule-like factors that allow us to use it. Our intuitions count for a lot in the process we will use.

Definition by necessary & sufficient conditions

• Essentialist theories argue that definitions must provide both necessary and sufficient conditions for being whatever is being defined. Good examples of this may be found in logic and mathematics, and in some of the most developed sciences like physics and chemistry.

Necessary and Sufficient Conditions

 A "necessary" condition is one without which something cannot be what it is. For example, if something is not a living creature, it cannot be a mammal. So being a living thing is a necessary condition for being a mammal. A "sufficient" condition specifies one way of being that thing. For example, "having the flu" is a sufficient condition for "feeling miserable." If you want to feel miserable, having the flu will do the job.

Definition of a square

Each is a necessary condition

- The sum of necessary conditions is a sufficient condition for being a square

Definition of "Chair"

- What are usually thought of as the defining characteristics of the word "chair" are not necessary conditions for the application of the term
 - No one of these conditions is "essential." There are chairs that do not satisfy each if these conditions
- The sum of those conditions are not sufficient for the application of the term
 - There are things that are not chairs that satisfy all the conditions

When We Look

- There are things that are chairs that do not satisfy each of these supposedly necessary conditions
- And there are things that are not chairs that satisfy all of them.







- A second historical theory argues that there are no essential characteristics, only conventions.
- A thing is a chair because it is called "a chair" by convention
- But there is an example of something that is clearly a chair but is not called a chairs.


 "Bridge" as in "bridge chair" for card playing and "bridge chair" for steering a boat are different words -OED.

Conclusion

- The defining characteristics do have relevance to the meaning of the word "chair" and perhaps some logical weight but seem to be neither necessary nor sufficient for the application of the word
- There are other characteristics we use to distinguish chairs from other seats

Three Kinds of Cases

- Clear cases of things that are things of a certain kind
- Clear cases of things that are things of a different kind
- Borderline cases that are at the blurry edge, might be seen as either one or the other (or neither)








The Swivel Seat is the Differentiating Characteristic

Translation

- Because words are embedded in a cultural historical and social context, they often don't translate exactly from one language to another
- So chair, stuhl, and chaise don't apply to the same sets of objects
- In Wittgensteinian terms they belong to different language games, embedded in somewhat different forms of life.





Family Resemblance

 Many terms defy definition in terms of necessary and sufficient conditions. For these terms a definition is best understood by listing of the family resemblance among objects referred to by the term. The idea is that one member of a family will have the same nose as another member, but not the same eyes or mouth, while some other member will have the same mouth, but not the same eyes or nose. Thus, there is no single (necessary) feature which can be found in all of the family members.
